PRESENT PERFECT

with EVER and NEVER

and with

JUST, ALREADY, YET, STILL

Have you ever travelled abroad? Have you ever visited Cuba?

No, never:

I have often travelled abroad, but I haven't visited Cuba.

positive: "I have visited..."

sogg. + simple pres."HAVE" + PAST PART.

negative: "I haven't visited...."
sogg. + "HAVEN'T" / "HASN'T"+ PAST PART.

interrog.: "Have you visited...?" simple pres."HAVE" + sogg. + PAST PART.

I have just spoken with her.

I have already spoken with her.

They have just arrived.
They have already arrived.

(and NOT "they are arrived")

Have you spoken with her yet?

Have they arrived yet?

I haven't spoken with her yet. or:

I still haven't spoken with her.

They haven't arrived yet.

or:

They still haven't arrived.
