
THE STORY OF ENGLISH

In the 5th century the **Anglo-Saxons invaded**




The Anglo-Saxons were Germanic tribes: they came from Northern Germany and spoke a Germanic dialect.

Their language (called "Anglo-Saxon" or "Old English") was spoken in Britain for a long time.

A TURNING POINT IN THE STORY OF ENGLISH

In 1066 England was invaded by the Normans.



The Normans spoke Norman French (NORMANDY IS IN NORTHERN FRANCE).

After the Norman invasion three languages were spoken in England:

French among the nobility and at court, Latin among the clergy and English among ordinary people.

Slowly French influenced the language spoken among the people.

In conclusion, we can say that Modern English is the result of the fusion of a Germanic Dialect (Anglo-Saxon) and a Latin language (French).
