FUTURE TENSES

We use TO BE GOING TO:

FOR INTENTIONS:

I'm going to study hard this term.

Are you going to phone your mother tonight?
I'm not going to cook tonight.

FOR IMMINENT SITUATIONS BASED ON EXTERNAL EVIDENCE:

There are black clouds in the sky. It's going to rain.

We use WILL:

FOR FUTURE PREDICTIONS BASED ON WHAT YOU THINK:

<u>I think</u> John will come to the party. I hope he won't be afraid of spiders.

(It's often used with the expressions I hope, I think, I'm sure, in my opinion)

We can also use adverbs such as *probably, certainly, definitely, maybe.*NOTICE THE POSITION: I will <u>certainly</u> go to the swimming pool.
I won't <u>definitely</u> invite Carol.

• FOR SPONTANEOUS DECISIONS (and also for offers, requests and promises):

I'm thirsty. I'll have a coke.

I'll send you the e-mail as soon as possible, I promise.

Will you open the window, please?

FOR INEVITABLE FUTURE FACTS:

John will be 50 in July.

We use the **PRESENT CONTINUOUS** with a future meaning:

FOR FUTURE ARRANGEMENTS:

We are going to the cinema tonight at 8.00.

I'm meeting Richard on Tuesday.

(It's often used with these time expressions: this morning/afternoon, tomorrow morning...., next Monday/ week/ month...)

We use the **PRESENT SIMPLE** with a future meaning:

• FOR TIMETABLES AND SCHEDULES:

What time does the flight leave? It leaves at 4.00.

The concert starts at 6.00 pm.

BE CAREFUL!

In sentences that talk about the future and are introduced by *if, when, as soon as, after, before, until* we use the **present simple:**

I'll go out **if** it is sunny

When it's sunny I'll go out.

As soon as it's sunny I'll go out.

After I finish my homework, I'll go out.

Before it starts raining I'll go out.

I'll read until he comes back.
